




Katrinka Sullivan




Loreena Hegenbart






Teresa Hendrix






Karen Lutrick



Central and SW





- Every state and U.S. territory has a Parent Center (TCFEF is the only PTI in Arkansas)
- Parent Centers encourage, inform, empower individuals, families, and providers



Parent Center






